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






Shaping cities for young children and their families

The Nurturing Neighbourhoods Challenge ("the Challenge") is hosted by the Smart Cities Mission, Ministry of Housing and Urban Affairs, Government of India, in collaboration with the Bernard van Leer Foundation and with the technical support of WRI India. This Challenge aims to incorporate a focus on neighbourhood-level improvements in Indian cities that promote healthy early childhood development (0-5-year-old children) in the planning and management of Indian cities. By shaping urban neighbourhoods that work well for pregnant women, young children, and their families, cities can nurture strong communities, economic development, and better quality of life for all.




At Mahatma Gandhi Museum, Rajkot

As part of the Nurturing Neighbourhoods Challenge, Rajkot has planned a pilot project at Mahatma Gandhi Museum to provide play pockets for young children, reflecting Gandhian thoughts, history and culture of the city.


This museum previously functioned as Mohandas Gandhi Vidyalaya, Alfred High School and Kathiawar High School, where Mahatma Gandhi studied in his school years. It was converted into a Museum to pay tribute to Mahatma Gandhi in 2018.

The museum has an outdoor children's areas to facilitate play and interaction among children visiting. The competition invites designs for this space that reflects Gandhian history through interactive, learning elements for young children and their families visiting this museum.

Project Location












The outdoor children's area in museum is currently an open space (approximately 1440 sq.m. in area) consisting of lawn space. This space needs to be developed keeping in mind families, parents and other caregivers waiting with their young children, school children who come to the museum, and spend some outdoor time during their visit.







Design criteria

This competition invites such ideas for the outdoor space of the museum, that provide playful learning environment for young children, which is synonymous of Gandhian thoughts.

The winning design proposal should consider the following -

- Outdoor play space that can serve as healthy and stimulating learning environment for young children by enabling nature-based and sensory play.
- Opportunities for young children to play independently, while allowing caregivers' supervision.
- Variety of sensory elements, textures that can help to develop fine and gross motor skills in young children, ensuring better physical and cognitive development.
- Use of cultural elements, local crafts and activities that reflect Gandhi's simplicity for play and teaching of young children

The proposal should ensure safe, accessible, green, playful and inclusive spaces where young children can wait, play and learn with their caregivers.



Participation guidelines

Who can apply?

- Students and professionals in the field of architecture, urban design, urban planning and other relevant fields can apply.
- Multi-disciplinary collaboration is highly encouraged.
- There is no restriction for number of members per team.
- Participants are allowed to submit multiple entries per team.
- Any team or participants associated or guided by organizers are discouraged from applying.

Last date of submission:

15th September 2021

How to apply?

- Interested candidates can download the competition package consisting of an application form, AutoCAD drawing of the site, satellite image of the site and photographs from here

- Kindly submit no more than 2 no. of A2 sheets highlighting the design proposals (one pdf file, file size upto 10mb).
- Submissions should consist of design proposal sheets and 300-word write-up explaining the design concept, how the proposal considers young children and their needs, while reflecting Gandhian principles (A4 pdf file – file size upto 1mb).
